

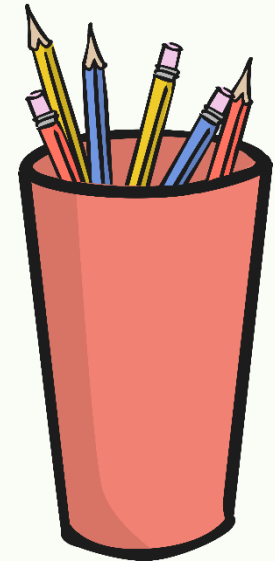



Using Saw and Seen

LO: I can use 'saw' and 'seen' accurately.

Success criteria:

- I know the past tense of 'see'.
- I know how to use 'saw' and 'seen' accurately.
- I know which type of verb must be used with 'seen'.





The past tense of 'see' is 'saw':

I saw

You saw

He saw

She saw

It saw

For example: I saw the film yesterday.

In the simple past tense, 'saw' indicates something that happened in the past and is now over and done with. **THERE IS NO HELPING WORD**

A Common Mistake

You may hear this (particularly in spoken English):

I seen the film yesterday.

This use of 'seen' is **INCORRECT**.

Remember: 'seen' must always be used with 'have' or 'has'. The word seen needs a HELPING WORD

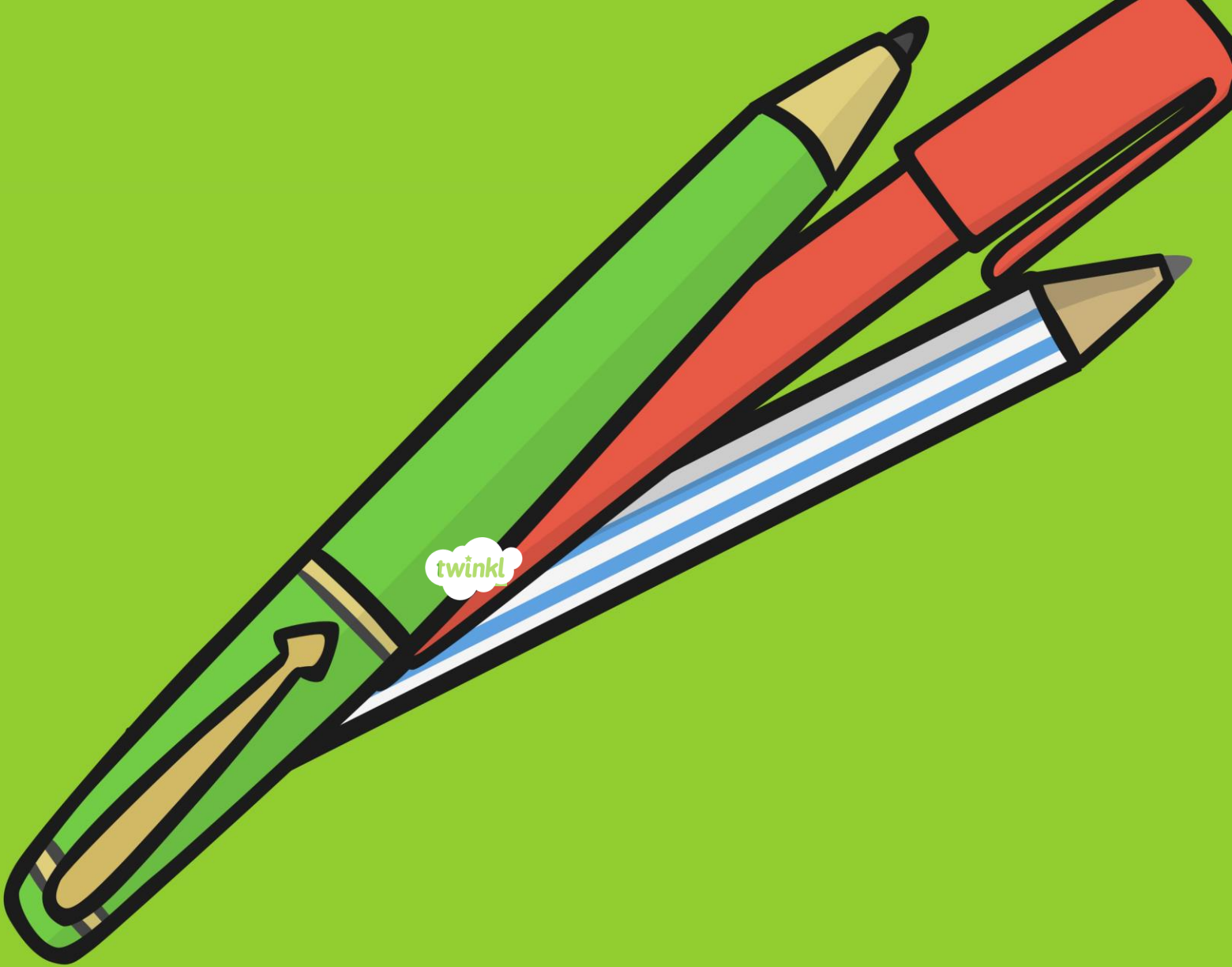
